

WHAT is ALRA?

ALRA is a drama school that has a reputation for producing down-to-earth committed actors, stage managers and technicians, ready to work and full of character and drive.

HOW do you choose a drama school?

Look at the graduates. Are they doing the kind of work you see yourself doing?
Go to the school and talk to the students. They know what it's like; they live it every day.

WHY train at drama school?

The overwhelming majority of actors, stage managers and technicians working in the business trained at a CDS drama school.

You'll get approximately 33 hours of class time every week (36 if you come to ALRA) with professional tutors and directors.

You'll get a Showcase in the West End (two if you come to ALRA as we showcase in London and Manchester)

You'll work with industry directors, designers, agents and casting directors.



Who trained ?!!

Miranda

Miranda studied on the Postgraduate course at ALRA and since has become one of the most recognisable names in British comedy. She earned her reputation as a stand-up comedian at The Edinburgh Festival and on the London stand-up circuit. She first came to prominence with her Radio 4 show Miranda Hart's House Party, and the BBC comedy Not Going Out.

Miranda's most recent sitcom Miranda, on BBC2, earned her two BAFTA Nominations, three British Comedy Awards and an RTS Award.

Sarah trained on the Three Year Acting course. Sarah is well-known for her gutsy female roles, including Dawn Rudge in Peak Practice and Allie Henshall in Cutting It. In 2006, she starred alongside Jude Law and Cameron Diaz in The Holiday.

Lucy graduated from ALRA in 2003. She's perhaps best known for her role as Jasmine in the remake of Reggie Perrin, starring alongside Martin Clunes. She also appeared in The Bourne Ultimatum with Matt Damon.

Her list of TV credits is impressive – her most recent roles include Rev (along with fellow ALRA graduate Jimmy Akingbola), New Tricks and Hotel Babylon. She's also worked with the BBC Radio 4 on several productions.

The BBC also have a big presence in the North.

In Wigan, running costs are less epensive so we offer reduced fees. The cost of living is also cheaper in the North.

What is ALRA South?

ALRA South is based at the Royal Victoria Patriotic Building, a magnificent Grade II listed Victorian Gothic building on the edge of Wandsworth Common, South West London. This is where ALRA has been based for the last 30 years.

The building is shared with artists and artisans, small businesses and private residents. It's a unique community – there's even a wine bar on site. ALRA South is just a short walk away from Clapham Junction, so there is excellent access to the city centre.

Three Year Acting course Professional actor training

Programme content:

Building Performance: Working from a variety of texts from Shakespeare to Contemporary Acting Studies: Acting Technique, Acting for Camera, Acting for Radio, Improvisation
Voice Studies: Voicing Text, Technical Voice, Articulation and RP, Choral Movement Studies: Creative Movement, Period Movement, Combat Contextual Studies: Contextualising Voice, Movement and Acting. Musicianship, Professional Practice and Industry Knowledge.

Third Year Acting students perform in three plays in the ALRA theatre, tour, make short films, a TV Presentation DVD and perform in Showcases in London and in Manchester.

Teaching

Teaching is supported by a host of freelance professionals currently working in the industry. There are workshops with Orbital and in-house workshops with Rosco and Flints.

All Technical students are First Aid trained in their first term at ALRA.

Public Productions

Technical Theatre students work on each public production ALRA North produces, including Film, TV & Radio. You take a different role on each production, and learn on the job.

Work Placements

Technical students at ALRA North will forge relationships with TV, Film and Radio producers across the North West, including BBC, Granada and independent film makers.

ALRA will you support you with:

- Study skills support for students who need extra help; a high proportion of our students are dyslexic or dyspraxic.
- Counselling at both centres as required. Sessions are free and confidential.
- A Hardship fund for students in urgent financial need.
- Accommodation days at both centres to put you in touch with agents, landlords and vacant student accommodation.
- Induction week at the start of First Year to help you settle in.
- Enrichment activities including WORKShopS with external practitioners.
- Social events like the Christmas Cabaret and Stand-up night.

- ALRA offers monthly, termly, and annual payment options, for private fee paying students on the Three Year Acting course and Postgraduate Acting course, with discounts available for termly and annual payments.
- Students at ALRA South will receive a £500 fee discount for annual payment in full, or a £250 fee discount for termly payments.
- Students at ALRA North will receive a £300 fee discount for annual payment in full, or a £150 fee discount for termly payments.

- Students on the Foundation Acting course at ALRA South and ALRA North will receive a £100 fee discount for annual payment in full, or a £50 fee discount for termly payments.
- Figures quoted demonstrate the full fee discount available for annual payment.

N.B. All fees may be subject to small annual increase. Some fee rates are externally imposed, and may fluctuate.

Where can I get help with fees?

ALRA is a private school, working with partners in Further and Higher Education. Depending on personal circumstances and the course undertaken, students can access funding from a variety of sources.

The Three Year Acting course and the Postgraduate Acting course are part-funded by Dance and Drama Awards (see below).

On the Stage Management & Technical Theatre Foundation Degree, Home/EU Students are eligible for a Tuition Fee Loan through the Student Loans Company (SLC) to match the level of tuition fees payable.

Students on the Three Year Acting course who are not offered Dance and Drama Awards are entitled to apply for a Student Loan to assist them with the cost of tuition. In 2012, it is expected that the maximum tuition fee loan available for this course will be $\pounds6,000$. This will leave a balance of tuition fees to be payable (see table, left) from private means. The amounts vary at ALRA North and ALRA South.

All students who are eligible to receive Student Loan funding, whether on the Three Year Acting course or Stage Management & Technical Theatre Foundation Degree, are eligible to apply for a Maintenance Loan to help with living expenses. The amount you are entitled to depends on your income (or that of your parents), and where you are living while studying, but can be as much as £7,675 at ALRA South, and £5,500 at ALRA North. Students living at home can apply for a maximum of £4,375.

Dance and Drama Awards (DaDAs) are scholarships funded by the Young People's Learning Agency. They are awarded by schools to the students who display the most potential to succeed in the profession. Applicants are considered for awards as part of their audition, and notified if they have been successful at a later date.

Please note, Dance and Drama Awards and Student Loans have eligibility criteria which must be met in order to receive funding. Please visit the respective websites [bottom previous page] for full details.

Professional and Career Development Loans are commercial bank loans that can be used to help pay for work related learning. You can borrow between £300 and £10,000 to help support the cost of up to two years of learning (or three years if it includes one year's relevant unpaid practical work). The Government will pay the interest on the loan while you are learning and for one month afterwards. You will then need to start repaying the loan as you would any other commercial loans product. The loan can be used to pay course fees or other costs such as travel and living expenses. You can also use the loan to supplement other forms of support such as grants or bursaries.

As the Professional and Career Development Loan is a commercial loan product, you should make sure you have investigated all the funding options that may be open to you to ensure you take an informed decision about whether the Loan is right for you. There is no funding support available for students on the Foundation Acting course.

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
The ALRA Outreach Programme.


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
